

CHIEF WARRANT OFFICER THEODORE H. MACK **US Army, Retired**



CWO Theodore Mack enlisted in the US Army in 1953, initially serving as a wheeled-vehicle mechanic in Korea. After attending Morse Code Intercept training in 1959, Mack served as Post Personnel Sergeant, Fort Meade, Maryland, from 1959-1964 and filled several personnel positions in Germany, at Fort Meade for the 6th Armored Cavalry Squadron, and in Vietnam for the 83rd Artillery until 1967.

In 1967, CWO Mack was appointed to Warrant Officer and became the Personnel Officer for the 109th Military Intelligence (MI) Group from 1969-1970. He attended the Counterintelligence (CI) Officers Course in 1971 and became a CI Technician, 116th MI Group, Washington, D.C. for several months before becoming the Chief, Warrant Officer Assignments, MI Branch through 1973. CWO Mack was the first warrant officer to hold this position.

After completing his Bachelor's degree in Political Science in 1975, CWO Mack became the Chief, Attaché Support Detachment, Fort Meade, Maryland, until 1980. He was also the first Warrant Officer to hold this position. From 1980-1981, CWO Mack was a Department of Defense Special Investigator at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, and then became the Special Agent-in-Charge until 1983. His culminating assignment was Deputy Director of Support, US Army Foreign CI Activity, Fort Meade, Maryland.

CWO Mack retired in 1988 with more than 35 years of service to the Army. His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (2 Oak Leaf Clusters), the Joint Service Commendation Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal (2 Oak Leaf Clusters).

He was inducted into the MI Hall of Fame in 1988.
