

LIEUTENANT GENERAL SIDNEY T. WEINSTEIN US Army, Retired (Deceased)



LTG Weinstein's distinguished career spanned 33 years, culminating in 1989 as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Department of the Army. LTG Weinstein was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry in 1956 following graduation from the US Military Academy. After Infantry duty with the 101st Airborne Division, he served with the Second US Army Research Group, Fort Meade, and from 1961 to 1962 with the 109th Intelligence Corps Group. In 1963, he was assigned to the 8th Special Forces Group, Panama, and later as an Advisor in Ecuador. In 1967, he was advisor to the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) 23rd Infantry Division in Vietnam.

After attending Command and General Staff College and graduate study at the University of Rochester, in 1970 LTG Weinstein joined the US Army Combat

Developments Command Intelligence Agency, Fort Holabird, moving with the command to Fort Huachuca. From 1972 to 1974, he commanded the 2nd MI Battalion, 66th MI Group, and later was the Group's Director of Operations. LTG Weinstein attended the US Army War College in 1977 and returned to Fort Bragg in 1977 where he served successively as G2; Commander, 525th MI Group; and then as Corps G2, XVIII Airborne Corps. While at Fort Bragg, he was instrumental in creating the basis that would become the Army's Combat Electronic Warfare and Intelligence (CEWI) structure.

In 1980, LTG Weinstein was assigned as Executive to the Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Headquarters, Department of Army. Selected for general officer rank, he became Deputy Commanding General for Support, Headquarters, Intelligence and Security Command (INSCOM), Arlington Hall Station, in 1981. In 1982, LTG Weinstein took command of the Intelligence Center and School. In this capacity he institutionalized, in doctrine, Intelligence Preparation of the Battlefield, the G2 work station, and CEWI concepts he pioneered at Fort Bragg. From 1985 until his retirement from active duty, LTG Weinstein distinguished himself as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Department of Army. As the senior Army intelligence officer, he improved support in special operations, reorganized the civilian career program, and created the

Army Intelligence Master Plan, which defined the intelligence force structure of the future.

LTG Weinstein retired in 1989. His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medals, the Army Commendation Medal, and Master Parachutist Badge.

LTG Weinstein was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1990 and served as the Honorary Colonel of the Corps from 1990 to 1994 and then as a Distinguished Member of the Corps until his passing in 2007. In 2010, the US Army Intelligence Center of Excellence honored him when it named the new Weinstein Training Complex after him. In addition, the Weinstein Award for Excellence in Military Intelligence was established in 2007.
